Geographic Information Systems (GIS)


Services are available to assist with data collection, custom maps and data development, demographic data, and infrastructure features

Kentucky Agricutural Development Information System

Kentucky's Area Development Districts have partnered with the U.S. Economic Development Administration, Kentucky Department of Agriculture, Governor's Office of Agriculture Policy, and Kentucky Agricultural Council to launch the Kentucky Agricultural Development Information System (KADIS).

KADIS will become the state's first interactive agricultural asset map, designed to identify agricultural trends within the state, drive economic development efforts, and plan for disaster mitigation.



"KADIS is the first of its kind in Kentucky and in the region," said

Phil Paradice, Jr., regional director for the Atlanta Regional Office of the Economic Development Administration. "There is great potential for economic growth and disaster planning and mitigation in this project, and we look to use this project as a model going forward in our work with other states in the Southeast."

The KADIS mapping project was developed by Kentucky's 15 Area Development Districts. The intent of this interactive mapping tool and database is to examine the agricultural assets of Kentucky's agriculture-based economic sector. KADIS will, among other functions, open new markets to Kentucky food producers and help farmers reach their market directly. It connects Kentucky consumers, agricultural businesses, farmers and markets, providing a one-stop shop to locate Bluegrass food products in specific markets or locations.

The main purpose of KADIS is to provide important information resources that allow members of the food supply chain to connect with each other, develop new markets, and enhance overall profitability.



Expected outcomes include:

- Help increase the sales of Kentucky grown and processed products
 - Enhance cooperation within the agricultural industry
- Aid rural and small business development

The website and web-gis portions of this project are complete. However, this is an on-going project and there will be continual updates to the data in order to remain up to date. Next steps for the project are to develop a marketing strategy to promote the project, present at conferences and other relevant meetings, and incorporate the project in to economic development strategies.

Covington Career Center

The task of making a dream a reality was seven years in the making – and in the early summer, the new Covington Career Center at 1324 Madison Avenue opened its doors.

Working in partnership with the City of Covington, the State's Cabinet for Education and Workforce Development, Brighton Center, the Transit Authority of Northern Kentucky (TANK), and Goodwill, the NKADD and Northern Kentucky Workforce Investment Board created the new facility that streamlines and expands workforce and training services in the community. It is a state-of-the-art employment and education center for job seekers and employers and will serve as a model for future career centers throughout the Commonwealth.





Girls Day Out

The NKADD received a 2014 Innovation Award from the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) Research Foundation for the Girl's Day Out, Women Building a Better World project. This project was developed in cooperation with the Northern Kentucky Workforce Investment Board (NKWIB).

Local Northern Kentucky manufacturers indicated a need for more potential employees in the employment pipeline. Due to an unprecedented number of retirements and the same skill gap the entire country is struggling to overcome, Advanced Manufacturing is facing a shortage of workers and is partnering with workforce and education to turn the tide and encourage girls to enter into nontraditional employment.

Five local county high schools converged on April 11, 2014 to learn about Advanced Manufacturing. The event, hosted by the Northern Kentucky Area Development District, Jefferson Community and Technical College, Kentucky Career Center and Brighton Center brought girls together with four major manufacturers and educational institutions to listen to women working in the Advanced Manufacturing field and to interact one-on-one with people working in the field. The experiences of the speakers, who were women from Dow Corning, Gallatin Steel, North American Stainless and Abzac, really resonated with the girls.

The speakers' educational backgrounds varied and each spoke of their personal story, their work experience, and education. There was one common thread among the women who spoke so passionately - each sincerely loved the work they do. The participants also enjoyed engineering activities, trying on 'tools of the trade', discussing career paths, and touring the Area Technology Center. The girls learned about wage ranges, career options, short-term certificates, funding options, and employment availability.

A survey completed by the girls indicated that 100% of those who completed the survey learned something new about Advanced Manufacturing.

Dr. Donald N. and Jane L. Berning Foundation

In September of 2012, Jack Benson, the current president of the Berning Foundation Board came to the NKADD office to see if he could find out more about the "meals on wheels" program. Little did we know that this was going to be the beginning of a wonderful friendship and working relationship that would result in strengthening the Home Delivered Meals Program in Northern Kentucky in ways we had not imagined.

The Bernings, who are both now deceased, had outlined the very narrow mission of the foundation they had established, prior to their passing. Mrs. Berning was very clear. She wanted there to be a definite focus on the meals on wheels program. She had always felt as though the program had been so vital to the community and felt like her money would be well spent if she donated in this area.

In November of 2012, the need was presented to the four person foundation board. At that time our waiting list had continued to grow and an almost one year wait for meals was the norm. After the presentation to the board, Anne Wildman (Associate Director-Human Services) left the meeting with a check for \$100,000 towards the meals program. Three months after that, we received another check for \$100,000 towards the meals program.

Most importantly, however, they pledged to support our meal efforts on an ongoing basis. To date, the foundation has provided over \$300,000 towards our local meals program. Thus far, we have been able to provide over 15,000 meals to almost 100 individuals with this additional funding.

NKADD is so grateful to the foundation for their tremendous generosity and flexibility in the use the funds to serve our elderly population in providing nutrition services. This is often a critical need and sometimes the wait is long before permanent funding becomes available. Partnerships like this are a "once in a blue moon" opportunity. We are forever thankful for the vision of Dr. and Mrs. Berning, the relationship with the foundation board, and the positive outcomes we have and will continue to experience from this partnership.





Northern KY's Collective Response to Heroin Epidemic

In November 2013, the Northern Kentucky Heroin Impact Response Task Force rolled out its Collective Response to the Heroin Epidemic. Here are some highlights of the progress made by the Heroin Impact Response Team in the past year:



Coordinator Hired

One of the plan's goals was to hire a dedicated coordinator to oversee the implementation of the plan. Through a grant from Interact for Health awarded to NKADD, and as a joint effort of the Northern Kentucky Independent District Health Department and the Three Rivers District Health Department, Jim Thaxton has assumed the role of Coordinator for the eight county NKY Region.

Overdose Prevention and Response Training
Northern Kentucky People Advocating Recovery
(PAR) has distributed over 100 naloxone
kits throughout the region, including sites in
Covington, Butler, and Fort Thomas.

Healthy Newborns House

Leadership Northern Kentucky's class of 2014 partnered with Transitions, Inc. to renovate the Healthy Newborn House and provide supplies and support to pregnant women in recovery from addictions.

Children's Home of Northern Kentucky Receives \$1.5M KY Kids Recovery Grant

Children's Home of Northern Kentucky (CHNK) was awarded a grant made possible through the KY Kids Recovery Grant Program will allow the Home to expand its services to include substance use disorder treatment. The KY Kids Recovery Grants were made possible after Attorney General Jack Conway settled cases against two pharmaceutical companies. The grant awarded to CHNK will provide, in part, the first residential treatment facility in Northern Kentucky that is targeted specifically towards youth battling substance abuse and chemical dependency.

NKADD is proud to assist in this effort with administrative coordination and fiscal management.















Human Services

Programs and services for the Aging and Disabled population and Transitional Housing Programs

Aging & Disability Resource Center

Trained staff assists individuals with identifying needs and providing information on available community options for seniors and adults with disabilities. Also provides screening for the programs administered through the Area Agency on Aging that require case management services.

Senior Center Services

Funding and assistance is provided to senior centers and nutrition sites. Centers serve as a gathering place for services and activities, including education, health promotion, wellness, outreach, and congregate meals. FY14 was a very productive year for all of our senior centers and included the opening of a brand new senior center building in Warsaw.

Program Linking Allied NKY Services (PLANKS)
Assistance is provided to those experiencing chronic homelessness by linking housing services, outreach, and case management.

Rural Case Management Program (Housing)
The Rural Case Management program provi

The Rural Case Management program provides case management to individuals and families located primarily in the five rural Northern Kentucky counties who meet the criteria for homelessness as defined by HUD.

Kentucky Caregiver Support Program

Provides support and financial assistance to low income grandparents raising grandchildren. We continue to see an increase in need for this program and were able to provide assistance to more individuals than in the prior fiscal year.

Family Caregiver Support Program

Provides respite, supplemental, outreach, and support services to individuals serving as primary family caregivers.

Chronic Disease Self-Management Program (CDSMP) These classes, developed by Stanford University, are designed to assist people with chronic health problems as a means to improve their outlook and manage their condition.

Northern Kentucky Senior Expo

This year was a special year, as it was our 20th annual Northern KY Senior Expo. We had great attendance and mixed up the entertainment with a magic show this year. We also expanded our health screening services to include Cardiovascular Screenings and Mammograms onsite.









Case Management

Assessment and Case Management services for Homecare, Adult Day Care, Title III, Fiscal Courts, and Medicaid Waivers

Consumer Directed Options (CDO)

Support Brokers work with over 450 Medicaid Waiver program participants to manage their allocated budgets, and select and hire their own service providers. Current participants range from 6 months to 96 years old. This program provides in-home services for at-risk persons that are designed to enable them to live independently.

Commodity Program

Food is made available to 34 local food pantries and soup kitchens for distribution to low-income individuals and needy seniors through the Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP).

Homecare Services

Case Management services are provided for at-risk older persons designed to enable them to live independently. Services include assessment and case management, personal care, homemaker, home delivered meals, and respite care.

Over \$7.5 million in program funding was brought into Northern Kentucky for the above services through NKADD. Over 30 exceptional partner agencies work with staff to provide these essential services to some of our most vulnerable populations.

The car crashed into a tree and Collin suffered a spinal injury which left him with quadriplegia and his family was told he would never walk again.

Prior to the accident
Collin enjoyed hunting, he
wrestled for his school team,
and worked at a pizza shop.
All that changed as Collin
spent the next three months
in hospitals. When Collin
returned home his mother,
Jennifer, needed a lot of help;
Collin required assistance
with all his needs and was
not able to be left alone.



One of the programs Jennifer turned to for help was the Consumer Directed Options (CDO) Program. Through the CDO program Collin is receiving Attendant Care and Respite Services. Attendant Care and Respite services are available when an individual requires 24 hour care. Attendant Care allows Jennifer to hire someone she trusts to stay with Collin while she returned to her nursing job. Respite allows her to hire someone so she can have a break and spent time with her other two children.




