AGING AND DISABILITY SERVICES

NKADD empowers older adults and individuals with disabilities to live independently in their homes by providing services and access to programs such as the Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC), Home Delivered Meals, In-Home and Caregiver Services, and Medicaid Waiver Assistance.

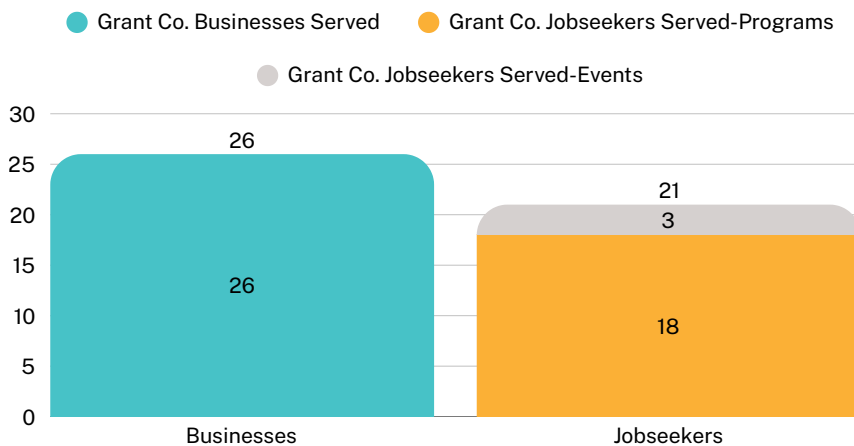

- Once someone moves into an assisted living facility, NKADD **Ombudsman** staff help ensure that individual is safe and their rights are upheld.
- The **Mobility** team coordinates with clients, communities, and providers to help individuals receive non-emergency medical transportation and other rides.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

In Grant County, residents and businesses have access to a wide range of services that connect jobseekers and employers. NKADD's Workforce team provides strategic direction and supportive services to build and maintain a thriving economy. NKADD workforce programs include Youth First, Employee Connections, and Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) programs and initiatives.

NKY Works is a collective impact workforce initiative dedicated to cultivating a workforce that is enthusiastic, prepared, and capable of filling and retaining quality jobs across all sectors of Northern Kentucky's economy. NKY Works is housed at NKADD and supported through a partnership with the Fiscal Courts of Boone, Campbell and Kenton Counties and BE NKY Growth Partnership.

Kentucky Career Centers Northern Kentucky works with regional partners to provide on-site resources for jobseekers to prepare, train, and find a career.

PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION SERVICES

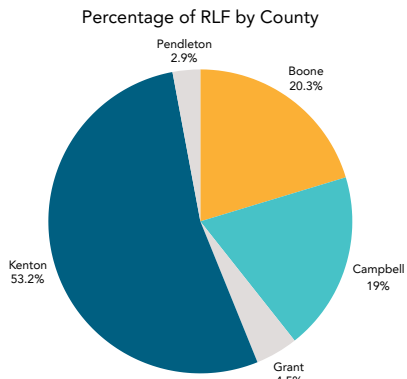

REVOLVING LOAN FUND

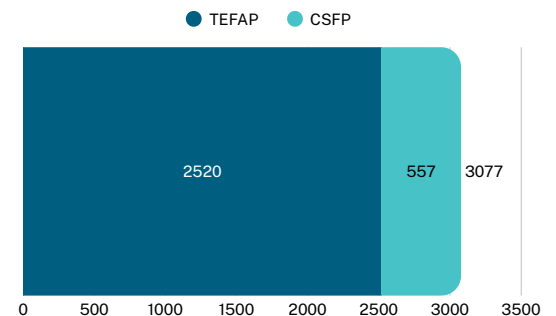
Established through a grant from the US Economic Development Administration, the Revolving Loan Fund program administered by NKADD provides a flexible and sustainable source of public funding for small business owners who cannot otherwise obtain adequate financing through private sources. Loans made through the RLF provide a necessary source of capital for small business owners that helps stimulate the local economy, create and retain jobs, and encourage private investment in the region. NKADD has made 40 loans totaling approximately \$2.2 million and creating 207 jobs since the original grant was received in 1998.



COMMODITIES

NKADD serves as the USDA Food Bank for the region's food pantries. Commodities from The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) are distributed to individuals through partnerships with 42 food pantries, mobile pantries, and soup kitchens across the eight-county region plus one location each in Bracken and Mason Counties.

CSFP is eligible to adults over age 60. Warehouse staff processed 62,103 cases of food in FY25, a value of \$2,224,090.80.



TEFAP was utilized 2,520 times and CSFP was utilized 557 times in Grant County during FY 2025

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND PLANNING

WATER AND WASTEWATER

- NKADD is contracted by the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) to serve as liaison and technical support for our jurisdictions.
- There are 11 proposed KIA water projects and three proposed KIA sewer projects for Grant County currently active in the Water Resource Information System Portal.
- There are three projects for Grant County that have committed funds:
 - Stringtown & Keefer Tank Restoration-\$344,464 from Cleaner Water Funds
 - Bullock Pen Water Treatment Plant Replacement-Design and Const-\$304,464 from Cleaner Water Funds
 - BPWD Looped Water Lines, Phase 14-\$869,000 from SRF Fund F
- Grant County is served in part by three water companies with 370.34 miles of waterline: Bullock Pen Water District, Corinth Water, and Williamstown Water.
- Grant County is served in part by Grant County Sanitary Sewer, Williamstown Wastewater, and Dry Ridge Wastewater with 24.52 miles of sewerline.

Grant County is served by the Community Development Planning division through a number of regional plans and strategic initiatives monitored and/or administrated by the NKADD:

- The Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS).
- 2024 Hazard Mitigation Plan Update: FEMA requires each jurisdiction included in the regional hazard mitigation plan to adopt the plan.
- The Energy Resilience Hazard Mitigation Plan: Ensuring a proper response for natural disasters impacting energy.

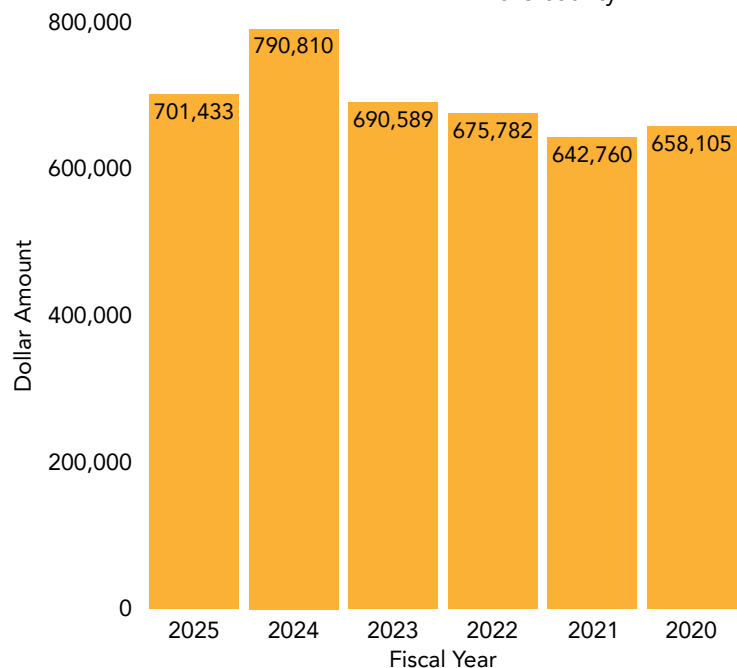
CENTERLINES

Community Development Planning coordinated with the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet to review survey data of the roads in the region to determine ownership of roadways. Between 2023 and 2025, approximately 232.28 miles of roadway in Grant County have been impacted by centerline edits.

Centerline review impacts road maintenance and County Road Aid Funding. This chart demonstrates the amount allocated to Grant County in the last 6 fiscal years, including FY 2025. Grant County is a part of the Transportation Cabinet's CO-OP program and the county's Road Aid funds are released by the Transportation Cabinet.
